

Risks and Rewards of AI

ChatGPT generative pre-trained transformer (GPT) has become a new buzzword in a matter of a few months. I personally tried ChatGPT several times, and every time I interacted with it, it surprised me more. The more I explored this large language model, the more curious I became. This curiosity eventually led me to the conference called "Beyond ChatGPT: Stuart Russell on the Risks and Rewards of A.I." organized by the Commonwealth Club of California.

I was very fortunate to meet <u>Stuart Russell</u> who is a Computer Scientist, a Scholar, a Researcher and the Professor of Computer Science at the University of California, Berkeley and receive a copy of his book called "Human Compatible".

he shared about the latest Insights developments in AI, and the power of ChatGPT truly amazed everyone in the conference hall. One of the three questions I asked him was whether there was a kill-switch in case the Al gets out of control, and his answer was positive. However, when I asked ChatGPT the same question "is there a killswitch for you?" and the response I got was the following: "As an Al language model, I do not have a kill-switch that can be used to shut me down completely." It was an interesting response, but it was scary at the same time. I highly recommend that you watch the video of the conference available on YouTube.

Russell's responses gave us insights on the potential risks and rewards of Al. Although Al has a lot of capabilities, it still has limitations.

SHINE LIKE A DIAMOND: A GLANCE AT A WOMAN'S IN IRAN

About the Author

Samaneh Nademi was born in Iran, and moved to the U.S. in 2022 to pursue her master's degree. She began her MBA program in Seattle, Washington, and transferred to Lincoln University in Spring 2023. Nademi has always been concerned about injustice and tyranny against women, and fascinated by the life stories of strong women. She has learned so much from the stories of these women overcoming discrimination, achieving success, and shining brightly.

Imagine yourself as a 7-year-old girl attending an all girls school forced to wear a uniform which completely covers your hair and entire body.

Imagine you are an athletic woman who is expected to compete in a volleyball or soccer competition while wearing a full hair and body-covered uniform as part of a mandatory requirement.

Consider yourself a fan of your favorite sports team, but your attendance at the stadium to watch and support them is prohibited.

Imagine you are a woman growing up with a passion to pursue a high level position in politics, but you are told that you cannot be considered because you are a woman.

Imagine, as a woman over 18, you are prohibited from going abroad without the notarized consent of either your father (if you are single) or your husband.

Can you imagine the possibility of your government permitting your husband to legally be married to a second wife, and not permitting you to divorce your husband for this reason?

Despite the fact that the new generation of young Iranian men opposes this unfair and anti-woman law, the shadow of this unjust regulation spreads insecurity amongst women in the country and makes them feel uncomfortable to ever want to get married. Sadly, the worst case scenario occurs in child custody, where the legislators have granted the right to men, and women are permitted to have custody only until their children become 7 years old.

These seemingly absurd and illogical circumstances are only a small part of the tyranny that women in Iran have endured for the past 45 years. The reason behind these misogynistic laws goes beyond the scope of this article. However, the primary reason is that the authorities believe according to Islamic religion, in order to maintain a healthy society and to prevent moral deviations, women need to cover their bodies and be more restricted, and under the control of men.

In spite of all these sad and hard-to-swallow facts and limitations, the most interesting aspect of this real story is that Iranian women are recognized as educated and successful citizens in their country as well as the world. Although the percentage of women in the labor force in Iran remains below 20 percent, female students have increasingly outnumbered males in higher education, accounting for approximately 60 percent of university students. And, as of 2020 women's literacy rates reached 85.5 and men's literacy rates reached 80.8 percent. (IranWire; The Iran Primer.)



One important point worth mentioning is that the women of Iran have realized in their hearts that no one is coming to grant them their rights, so they must build opportunities from obstacles and not allow inappropriate and restrictive legal conditions to prevent their improvement and development. Over time, they have become aware of the importance of higher academic education to regain their lost rights. They have become entrepreneurs, doctors, surgeons, astronauts, dentists, physicians, athletes, painters, actresses, teachers, engineers, biologists, lawyers, psychologists, writers, fashion designers, and many other professions.



Editor: "Student Services plays a vital role in every educational organization, so we would like to ask a few questions to help Lincoln students get to know you better. To start with, can you tell us a little about yourself and your past experiences before joining

Ms. Iman: "I was born and raised in Oakland, California, so Oakland is home for me. I have a long-standing history in sports — coaching and playing — and I've had vast experience in many different categories of life. I've done admin positions before, and I was in sales, but I decided to transition to something more developmental, where I can have a bigger impact on students like yourself."

Editor: "What sparked your interest in sports?"

Ms. Iman: "My parents didn't know what to do with me, and I had too much energy, so they threw me into soccer. And from nine years old until now I've been stuck to it, and I love it. It will always be a part of me."

Editor: "What do you think are the biggest challenges facing students today, and how do you plan to address those challenges in your role?"

Ms. Iman: "I think kids have almost too much access, and everything is findable, doable, and searchable on their phone. So, I think our challenge as a school is meeting them where they are in their ability to access things. We can update, stay relevant, and give them tools that will help them in this quickly accessible world. I would say one of the challenges is just getting everyone on board in the same direction."

Editor: "How can students get involved with student services, and what types of services does Lincoln need and require?

Ms. Iman: "I really feel like we need more student involvement. I am a big advocate of giving students a well-rounded experience. I know we're a small campus and we don't have the typical facilities that a huge university has, so I think the more we can involve the students in these social activities, whether it be workshops, going out to events, or hosting things here like cultural day coming up. I really feel like the students engagement needs to rise and increase so that Lincoln students can get a full well-rounded experience here and not just go to class and then go

Editor: "So, what upcoming changes should the students of Lincoln expect from the student services?"

Ms. Iman: "I definitely want to put together more social activities for you guys. I feel like student services needs to up their game and do a better job of engaging you guys in all kinds of events and social outings so that you guys feel part of a student body and part of Oakland. Oakland is a wealth of food, culture, diversity on many levels, art, music, and I think I want to expose you guys to all that Oakland has to offer."

Editor: "So we hear that Ms. Iman said that the student services is ready to up their game. So, we should also up ourselves and not hold us back and bring out the energy and whatever aspirations, dreams, enthusiasm we have come here for and put ourselves together and join hands with the student services.'

WORDS OF WISDOM: PROFESSOR AITYAN REFLECTS ON 18 YEARS AT LINCOLN UNIVERSITY



After 18 years, beloved professor, Dr. Sergey Aityan, retired from Lincoln University. Before moving on to pursue his many other interests, Dr. Aityan agreed to share a few words of wisdom with Lincoln Chronicle. Here is the transcript of the conversation on December 5, 2022, between Professor Dr. Sergey Aityan and Lincoln Chronicle Editor-in-Chief, Zarafshaan Nadeem.

Editor: "Today, we have with us one of the most beloved professors of Lincoln University, Dr. Sergey Aityan. He's been a professor of Economics, Management Information System, Computer Science, and Business Finance. He has taught a lot of subjects, and he's been the chairman of MIS Department. We welcome you, sir, for today's interview. Thank you. So, I would be asking you a few questions.

Editor: "How many years have you been a part of the Lincoln family?"

Dr. Aityan: "I've been here for 18 years now. That's a long time."

Editor: "Would you like to enlighten us about your experience here at Lincoln?"

Dr. Aityan: "As I've been here for 18 years, it means that I've had a positive experience, and I love teaching students. I do a lot of research. I love it."

Editor: "How would you describe your teaching style?"

Dr. Aityan: "My teaching style, some people may like it, some people may not like it. I don't deliver just facts to my students. My major goals and my major objectives in teaching students is to teach them how to think. So, to understand things rather than memorize things. This is my teaching style."

Editor: "What are your personal and professional interests?"

Dr. Aityan: "I have many professional interests, therefore I was the director of the Multidisciplinary Research Center. I have multiple backgrounds. I started as a strategic physicist and mathematician, then I switched to theoretical biology. I've done a lot of work in theoretical computer sciences, particularly in artificial intelligence, then economics, business. I've published many papers in all these areas, and books. So, to summarize, I have multidisciplinary interests. My personal interests... I'm interested in humans and people, definitely. I'm also interested in sports. I swim every day, and I'm a pilot. I fly planes, really. Yeah, I have many fascinating interests, so I have no time to be bored."

Editor: "That's amazing. So, Professor, what are your greatest successes or accomplishments in your entire working career at Lincoln?"

Dr. Aityan: "I would prefer others say what's my greatest success and accomplishment. I don't ever think I could, so let's let other people be the judge."

Editor: "That's a great answer. So, what have been the most significant changes in Lincoln since you started, and what changes were for the better?"

Dr. Aityan: "When I joined Lincoln University, it was a very small school, practically unknown. I hope that I was a part of the growth of Lincoln University, just one of many faculty and staff who helped develop the great success of this university."

Editor: "So, what are the other changes that you foresee in the coming years?"

Dr. Aityan: "Well, definitely, nothing in this world is perfect, right? I believe that Lincoln University can continue to improve its quality of education and research, expand its academic programs, and enhance its reputation in the academic community. I also think that it's important to focus on attracting and retaining talented faculty and staff, as they are the backbone of any great institution."

Editor: "Now, I'd like to ask you about your advice for your students. What should they focus on, and what skills should they develop to succeed in their careers?"

Dr. Aityan: "Well, first and foremost, I think it's important for students to develop critical thinking skills and to be able to analyze complex problems. They should also focus on developing their communication and interpersonal skills, as these are essential for success in any field. In terms of specific skills, I think that students studying economics should have a strong foundation in mathematics and statistics, as these are important tools for analyzing economic data. They should also be familiar with economic theory and the various schools of thought in economics."

Editor: "Finally, I'd like to ask you about your future plans. What do you see yourself doing in the next few years?"

Dr. Aityan: "Well, I plan to continue teaching and conducting research, as these are my passions. I also hope to publish more books and articles on various subjects, including economics, artificial intelligence, and other areas that I'm interested in. Additionally, I plan to continue flying planes and swimming, as these are my hobbies that help me stay active and healthy."

Editor: "That's wonderful, and we wish you all the best in your future endeavors. Thank you so much for joining us today, Dr. Aityan."

Dr. Aityan: "Thank you for having me. It's been a pleasure."

- Be careful not to compare; it can make someone feel like their pain isn't valid.
- Do not judge; put your personal opinions and biases aside.
- Ask what you can do to support them.
- Keep your word; when a person is struggling, the last thing they need is to feel abandoned by someone else.

Deon: "Building lifelong relationships with the staff and becoming the first student athlete to graduate, with a masters at that!!!!!"








